Our School

Wormley Church of England Primary School is a large, primary, church school. We have the capacity for 480 children (Nursery – Year 6). There are two classes in each year group. We have a morning Nursery class and an afternoon Nursery class.

The school is set on a large, beautiful site, opposite the railway line and near the River Lea. The school is situated at the centre of its community.

We have extensive grounds incorporating a large field, three playgrounds a Multi Use Games Area (MUGA), two Forest School areas and trail, an Art Bus, trim trails, two therapy rooms, two Breakfast and After School Club rooms and a Nurture Garden.

We are an accredited Forest School. Children in YN - Y2 have a weekly session at Forest School.

Our Forest School Areas

Forest School is essentially outdoor, nature-based learning that focuses on the holistic development of the child. It is child-centred with a high adult to child ratio. Observation, rather than direction, is key, and children learn to care for the natural environment through their activities. Children learn to assess, appreciate and take risks, making sensible, informed decisions about how to tackle the activities and experiences they encounter. There are 15 classes altogether. Each year group has 2 classes of approximately 30 children. Each Early Years class has a teacher and 2 EY practitioners. This enables each key group to consist of 10 children per adult. All other classes have a teacher and a teaching assistant.

Either side of the main reception are two areas of the school. One is the Early Years and Key Stage 1 area and the other is the Key Stage 2 area. Each area has its own hall and library.

We have a large Learning Resources/Library/Computer Room in KS2 which is open before school and during lunchtime for children who need a space for home learning.

Classes can use the Art Bus for art lessons. The top deck has enough space for 30 children and resources are kept on the lower deck.

There is a nurture room and 2 sensory rooms – one in each area.













There is an equal focus on learning and wellbeing. We know children learn best when they feel safe and happy.

Our curriculum is planned to develop our pupils' potential, and to prepare them for the future.

Our vision for our pupils

Have Faith, show Respect, take Responsibility and Achieve

Our vision is that, from arrival at Wormley, each child should grow in their awareness of themselves and others, moving forward in their learning journey and maximising their learning potential in school and beyond.

Our intention is that they come to know that they are loved by God, and therefore, all things are possible. To this end, we provide an ambitious, relevant and creative curriculum that supports children to develop as individuals with the knowledge, skills, behaviours and attitudes necessary to navigate and flourish in our rapidly changing world where high technology must be balanced with respect for humanity and the natural world.



The Curriculum

The curriculum, in its broadest sense, will develop curious, engaged, life-long learners who have faith in God, themselves and others; show respect for themselves and others, and the world in which we live; take responsibility for themselves and in their learning; and achieve their potential by developing as resilient, resourceful and reflective beings.



We are passionate about the teaching of Maths and English

Early Maths is all about number sense, pattern, counting and shape.

The language of maths is taught from a very early age.

We have adopted a mastery approach based upon the principles of fluency; talk; concrete, pictorial and abstract representations (CPA); using misconceptions and applications to improve children's ability to reason mathematically.

We use Hertfordshire's Essential Maths planning, White Rose Power Maths booklets, NCETM and NRICH resources.



Number Blocks, Number Bot and TT Rockstars are fantastic on-line resources to develop fluency in Maths Phonics is introduced in the Early Years and children learn to read phonically decodable books. As they become more independent readers, children have access to a wide range of books and e-books (fiction and non-fiction). We assess children regularly and check that they are reading varied and challenging texts.

We have adopted a Talk 4 Writing Approach to support children to write a range of texts confidently and independently.

We develop speaking and listening through drama and debate.

Spring is our Reading Challenge Term and we celebrate World Book Day.



Our Learning Agents and their Social Stories

We teach the children to be super social learners and to recognise their own agency.

As a super social learner, there are a number of agents within you which can be deployed to make you a better learner.

There are 7 learning agents: Agent Considerate, Agent Curious, Agent Resilient, Agent Creative, Agent Reflective, Agent Confident and Agent Strategy.

Sometimes you might only need to call upon one agent but at other times you may need a team of agents.

Each agent has certain **characteristics** which will enable you to learn effectively as long as you use them. Let's find out more about the agents...



Agent Considerate - the power of thoughtfulness Agent Considerate is very thoughtful and thinks deeply. This agent enjoys collaborating with others and shows courtesy towards others' ideas, opinions and beliefs. Agent Considerate has empathy for people, shows compassion and can forgive them when things go wrong. Agent Considerate is a good listener and tries hard to be friendly and inclusive of everyone which makes for a very popular agent. (Thought bubble)

Agent Confident - the power of positive attitude Having faith in their own capability, their knowledge and understanding is a key aspect of Agent Confident. This agent is gaining wisdom whilst embarking on a learning journey. Agent Confident has the ambition to achieve their goals and realise their potential. On their journey they show humility to ask for help if needed and feel empowered to maintain their vision. (Superhero pose)



Agent Creative - the power of imagination

Agent Creative has enthusiasm for everything they do. This agent dares to think outside the box which makes them flexible enough to achieve their goals. Agent Creative is able to make connections about the world around them and consider different perspectives. When Agent Creative is in action, they are resourceful and not afraid to take risks. This allows them to generate new ideas in their thinking which paves the way for originality. (Paintbrush)

Agent Reflective - the power to improve





Agent Resilient - the power of yet Agent Resilient demonstrates perseverance when taking on new challenges and uses grit to overcome obstacles. This agent has incredible bouncebackability and optimism, even when stuck in the learning pit. Agent Resilient knows that the power of yet helps us to be resilient along the learning journey. When tackling something difficult, Agent Resilient shows bravery, determination and commitment in

achieving their goal. (Shield)

Agent Curious - the power of wonder Wondering about the world and asking questions is what Agent Curious does best. When faced with new and challenging tasks, this agent has an open-mind and explores solutions inquisitively. Agent Curious has a thirst for knowledge and enjoys engaging with other people's ideas and activities. (Magnifying glass)



pause often and notice, choosing when to snorkel or scuba dive to find out more. Agent Reflective demonstrates self-discipline. This agent creates and retells stories of success. narrating their learning journey, which helps with understanding how to navigate the next step. Agent Reflective is happy to learn from mistakes. They use Kaizen (a little bit of improvement everyday) as a reminder that learning is a continuous life-long journey and shows gratitude for all opportunities to grow. (Mirror)

Agent Reflective does not rush learning. They

Agent Strategy - the power of focus Agent Strategy always has a plan and uses reasoning and evidence to justify choices. This agent thinks about the best approach to apply to a situation. Agent Strategy has the purpose of a task in mind and makes deliberate and intentional decisions. Agent Strategy thinks critically and doesn't always go with the first idea. (Tool box)



The Story of the Well-Being Agents

Our Wellbeing Champs teach about wellbeing through stories.

Once, there was a young champ, who was gifted with several attributes of wellbeing. These attributes included *laughing*, mindfulness and a healthy out-look on life. His mission was to share and ensure that others understood the *positive* benefits of these attributes and how, if they followed a simple routine, they too could benefit and experience a healthy and *balanced* approach to life.

There are 4 wellbeing agents: Agent Lifestyle, Agent Nutrition, Agent Kinetic, and Agent Mindfulness,

Each agent has certain **characteristics** which will enable you to stay healthy and maintain your wellbeing and positive mental health, as long as you use them. Let's find out more about the agents...

Agent Lifestyle, always had a healthy night's sleep to make sure that he woke each day in a positive mood which always helped him spend happy times with his friends and family, building strong friendships. He also practised mindful breathing daily to clear his mind to calm and achieve peacefulness for his emotions for the day. This ensured regulation and he ate a balanced diet whenever he could.

Agent Lifestyle wanted to meet likeminded Champs to help him spread the message of wellbeing and decided to travel in his 'Mind-Mobile' in search of Champs to combine and share his message.



The two Champs went to meet someone who was renowned for his love of sports, games and activities. He helped people get stronger and become more active in their lives, improving both their health and their fitness. His special abilities included stamina, creativity in movement, agility and encouragement. He believed that anyone could achieve a fitter and healthier life with the right education and encouragement. He believed in endurance as a key skill.

Agent Kinetic agreed to join the Champs in their mission to spread the message amongst others and with his leadership skills set up routines for both Agent Life-style and Agent Nutrition to follow and endorse.



Agent Life-style had met **Agent Nutrition** and he loved the way he could learn and improve his life-style and *diet* even more with her help! He knew it would increase his energy. He asked her if she would help him teach others about living a healthy lifestyle and advising on what to eat to maintain this, sharing a message of *diversity*. She agreed enthusiastically because she already knew of another who could help them further

> There was such a person- she was called **Agent Mindfulness**. She had the amazing ability to empathise with others, show *positivity* and understand her own and other's emotions and help others control, *regulate* and understand their own feelings when needed in order to achieve a sense of *peacefulness*. Agent Mindfulness had many friends and encouraged healthy relationships and friendships. She always looked on the bright side and was excellent at *listening* if others should need someone to talk to.

Support For Children With Additional Needs

On entry to our school, we screen all the children to see if they have any speech and language difficulties (WellComm Screening) as we know that language is key in children's development and future success.

We employ our own Speech and Language Therapist and Assistant so that we can identify and address any language needs quickly.

We are an Elklan communication friendly school which means that all staff are trained in communication and language development. We use a range of language programs to address additional needs including N.E.L.I. Talk Boost and Word Aware.

We have additional teaching space for children needing additional support.



We have four Special Education Needs Co-ordinators (SENCos) in our team who can offer support to children and families with a range of needs and disabilities.







Into Early Years

Here at Wormley Church of England Primary School, children can start their education at the age of 2 - at Wormley Preschool.

We have 2 Nursery classes - one in the morning and one in the afternoon.

We are able to accommodate families who are in receipt of 30 hours funding. Children can spend mornings in our nursery and afternoons in the Preschool.

High quality EY learning is play-based. Children spend 50 percent of their time learning outside of the classroom - sand pits, trikes, mud kitchens, climbing, painting, building, exploring etc.

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

A strong early years foundation is essential for a child's development both in terms of wellbeing and learning. As children play and learn together, they are developing essential knowledge, skills, dispositions and behaviours.

There are 3 prime areas:

Communication and Language
Physical Development
Personal, Social and Emotional Development

The statutory framework for the early years foundation stage (2017) states that the prime areas of learning are 'particularly crucial for igniting children's curiosity and enthusiasm for learning, and for building their capacity to learn, form relationships and thrive'.

The prime areas of learning are considered time-sensitive which means that our practitioners working with the youngest children will focus on these areas more strongly.

Specific Areas of Learning



Our Nursery Classroom

The specific areas provide a context for building on early development and learning beyond the prime areas. The specific areas are dependent on the prime areas and cannot be encountered in isolation from communication and language, personal, social and emotional development, and physical development, since the child is always experiencing the world through emotions, communication and physical and sensory involvement.

The 4 specific areas of learning:

- > Literacy
- > Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design

Classrooms and outside areas are set up to encourage play and learning in the 7 areas of learning

Reception

Children's progress is tracked through observations which are recorded in an on-line journal, known as Tapestry. We share our observations with families. You can record your own observations on Tapestry too. Next steps are added so that we know what children need to learn next.

Into Key Stage 1



There are four classes in Key Stage 1. Y1 classes are to the right and Y2 classes are to the left Autumn Term is History term















The KS1 corridor and classrooms

KS1 are self-contained



- ✓ Parents drop and collect children from the external classroom doors. This enables parents/carers to speak with class teachers.
- ✓ Children in Y1 begin the year learning through play – as they did in the early years. Gradually, they are able to concentrate for longer and begin more formal learning from the National Curriculum.
- ✓ The DfE's Letters and Sounds approach is adopted to help children with word reading skills and spelling. Reading books are changed regularly.
- ✓ Early Maths involves learning with manipulatives and visuals to help children understand concepts. Children learn important number bonds.

Our Approach to Behaviour and Wellbeing

Our school aims to be a very *nurturing* environment for children.


Nurture is built upon 6 principles and requires a therapeutic approach to behaviour since all behaviour is communication.

All teaching staff are trained in a therapeutic approach to behaviour intervention (STEPS approach). This means that every behaviour intervention considers the effect on each individual's feelings.



We believe in growing children, not storing them.





A Rights and Responsibilities Behaviour Policy

We have chosen to develop a *Rights and Responsibilities* policy because we want pupils to consider the consequences to their choices in the context of what is 'fair' and 'just': the children's *rights*. The policy emphasises prevention, restoration and reparation as well as applying proportional consequences where appropriate. Children learn about their *responsibilities* in order to protect everyone's rights.

We understand that, where people are negatively affected by poor behaviour choices, appropriate behaviour needs to be taught and modelled to the children. Working with the children's feelings and experiences develops their internal discipline which leads to long-lasting change.

As a church school we believe that we need to teach the children how to forgive and repair situations in a way that helps them value pro-social behaviour. All staff agree to follow the practices set out in our policy and take active responsibility for growing the children's independence and capacity for self-discipline.

The governing body accepts this principle and seeks to create an environment in the school which encourages and re-enforces pro-social behaviour. Furthermore it accepts that society expects pro-social behaviour as an important outcome of the educational process.



Into Lower Key Stage 2

There are four classes in Lower Key Stage 2 - Years 3&4. We begin passing through the Y3 corridor. Autumn is History Term

Historical Enquiry: What can you learn about Egyptian life from Egyptian mummies and their tombs?

Y3 are studying Ancient Egypt. They have recreated an Egyptian tomb. Typically, they visit the British Museum to learn about Egyptian life and after-life.




In Upper KS2 we have a Science Pod
